Art installations that provide a learning link to nature and culture.

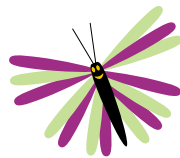
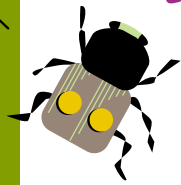

For architects, designers, builders, contractors, developers and interested individuals

Saturday, October 19

Faculty: Henning Gatz, president, Aquacare Environment, Inc., the lead contractor for Living Machine™ design/build projects, including the system installed on the IslandWood campus.

Water is an increasingly limited resource. Even in wet climates such as Western Washington, water conservation is essential if population growth rates are to be sustained. Living Machines™ are advanced water-treatment systems that mimic nature by using a diverse ecology to treat wastewater for reuse as irrigation and/or toilet flush water. They are well suited to facilities that wish to conserve water, demonstrate and teach ecological principles and have an aesthetic, interactive system.

Henning will present an overview of wastewater-treatment technologies and take you on an in-depth tour of the Living Machine™ now operating at IslandWood. Covering history, design, construction and operating principles, the program will use the IslandWood Living Machine™ as a hands-on laboratory.

Photovoltaic Use for Commercial and Residential Projects

Faculty: Doug Broach, project sales manager, SCHOTT Applied Power, North America's leading photovoltaic distribution and system provider.

Doug will talk about how photovoltaic (PV) technology has changed in efficiency and price, showing why renewable resources make sense economically and for our environment. Discussion will include current and future products, plus applications and uses for PV in residential or commercial environments. Review of the economics of PV will include energy savings, peak-load reduction, renewable energy credits or "green tags," tax incentives and utility-risk management benefits. **QUICK NOTE: Photovoltaic systems convert sunlight into electricity to power communications equipment, light homes and run household appliances.**

Straw Bale Home Construction

Faculty: Terry Phelan, architect, owner of Living Shelter Design. Terry has been in the home design and building industry since 1976. Straw bale construction became a passion in 1996. After taking several workshops, she began teaching about building with bales in 1998. She now incorporates education about various sustainable choices with custom home design in her Issaquah, WA, architectural practice. She is active in the Northwest EcoBuilding Guild and the American Institute of Architects Committee on the Environment.

Learn about all phases of straw bale construction: theory, design, codes, siting, foundation, and moisture issues. Terry will include you in hands-on practices, including the raising of bales, setting door and window backs, and prepping a wall for stucco. You will leave with a good understanding of the history and benefits of straw bale, how to incorporate other sustainable features on a budget, and how a straw bale wall is built.

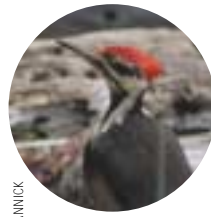

Understanding the Language of Birds

Saturday, October 19

Faculty: Chris LaLiberté, staff of Wilderness Awareness School, one of the nation's leading schools for tracking and naturalist skills development.

When was the last time you were outside and noticed — or heard — a bird? Did you know what it was saying to you? Birds are everywhere and are very alert. They are the eyes of the forest, and their language of calls and body language forms an intricate "alarm system" that is all around us. In this field-study day, you'll learn about the calls and postures that birds use to communicate, the ways in which animals create and respond to bird alarms, and how to avoid "triggering" this alarm system in order to get closer to animals. After this day, any hike in the forest or trip outside will yield new and exciting adventure. Please dress for the weather and be prepared to spend part of the program seated on the ground.

Puget Sound Geology and Local Fault Line Exploration

This is a great beginners class; those with prior weaving experience will be taught a more challenging version of this lovely wetland basket.
